Overview

The importance of Tobacco Control

According to the Canadian Council for Tobacco Control, in Canada: Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable illness, disability and premature death; More than 40,000 people die each year from tobacco related deaths (just over 20%); and tobacco kills 3x more people than alcohol, AIDS, illicit drugs, car accidents, suicide, and murder combined. In Nova Scotia, over 1,600 die each year from smoking related illness and two hundred more die from exposure to second-hand smoke. The following list provides resources and information on developing tobacco control initiatives, government policies, reports, successful community initiatives and organizations focused on irradiating smoking and related tobacco uses.

What You Will Find In This Document:

Within the “Tobacco Control” resource list, you will find a variety of information from provincial, national and international sources on the topic of tobacco and programs to help reduce its use. This resource list is organized into six sections: *Overview*, *Documents*, *Organizational Links*, *Other Tools and Resources*, *Government Legislation* and *Funding Opportunities*. Description: This report provides national and provincial results of this important Canada-wide survey based on over 19,000 questionnaires completed by young Canadians in grades 5-9 and interviews with almost 18,000 of their parents. It describes smoking practices and related knowledge, beliefs, and attitudes as well as social influences, restrictions on smoking and reports on drug and alcohol use. The report is considered “technical” only because of this level of detail, not because of any requirement for statistical sophistication to read it. The intended readership consists primarily of individuals in public, voluntary, and private agencies which are responsible for developing policies and programs to combat youth smoking.

Exposure rates to second-hand smoke among non-smokers are examined.
